Message from the District Nurse about Head Lice

What to know about Head Lice

Head lice are often unwelcome visitors at day care centers and schools. Head lice are tiny parasites that live in hair and feed on blood from our scalp. They mostly lay their eggs near the roots of the hair, close to the scalp which usually hatches within one week. The eggs laid by head lice are called nits. They multiply and spread quickly.

However they are fairly harmless and don't carry any diseases. Having head lice also isn't a sign of poor personal hygiene or an unclean living environment. They don't carry bacterial or viral diseases. By understanding more about how to treat & prevent head lice, you can be a part of promoting a comfortable and healthy place to learn.

Head lice are tiny, grayish-white 6-legged insects about this long (-). If they are filled with blood, they will look red. They do not have wings, so they cannot fly. They do not jump but they can move very fast. This makes it hard to find them in the hair. Nits are the eggs of the lice. They look like bits of dandruff in the hair but do not flake off when touched. They are stuck to the hair. They are about this size (').

Lice are usually spread from child to child when sharing clothing, hats, scarves, combs, brushes, hair trims or helmets that have strands of hair with nits. Lice can also be passed when playing contact sports.

The SINGLE most important thing to prevent lice is to "Never Share What Touches the Hair." Teach every child to not share combs, brushes, hats, scarves, hair accessories, "scrunchies," helmets, headphones, or pillows. Additionally, parents could inform other parents of their child's closest

friends to check their children for lice since the children play together. Please check your child's hair often during the school year, especially if you have been informed of a lice concern or receive an exposure notice from school.

Independent Study

Do you need to take a few days off in the middle of the school year? Need to visit a sick family member or go on a family getaway? Did you know that if your child has overall good attendance, you may be eligible to take what's called an Independent Study, which would excuse their absences for a 5-9 day period? It is an **official contract** between the Principal, Teacher, Parent and Student, stating that the parent is acting as the "teacher" for the duration of the contract and will ensure that all work is completed to get credit for the absences. To apply for an Independent Study, here are the steps:

- Apply in the office at least two weeks in advance
- The attendance clerk will check the form
- The Principal then approves or denies the request
- Once approved, the teacher then has 2 weeks to get all of the classwork together
- The work is due upon the end date of the contract (if work is not turned in that day, the contract is null and void and the absences will then be unexcused)
- Only ONE Independent Study contract is allowed per year



3rd Grade Music 44

This year, 3rd graders will be offered the opportunity to take music classes. It is different this year, in that our music teachers will be offering Music Appreciation classes at the beginning of the year as opposed to starting with violins. They will learn the fundamentals, which also includes singing. They will then be introduced to all sorts of instruments, later in the year. The music teachers will be visiting the 3rd grade classrooms and speaking with the students, trying to encourage them to come to music class. Music classes are electives, they are not mandatory for students to attend. Classes will begin after Fall break.






Science Lab

SEL Corner (Social Emotional Learning)



Happy High 5 Friday!! Hopefully you gave or received some High 5's at school today. If not, it's not too late. Come make some High 5 connections at pick up time! A great by-product of #SEL is that it not only creates the foundation for life-long learning but also stimulates the development of our most critical interpersonal skills; the ability to work collaboratively, show empathy for others, and communicate respectfully with diverse people (SEL Learning EDU).

Plus, social emotional learning impacts academic outcomes for students of all backgrounds!

A 2011 <u>meta-analysis</u> on the effectiveness of social emotional learning found students in schools with high-quality social emotional learning programs showed an average gain of 11% in academic achievements.

For every dollar schools invest in social emotional learning, they see an average long-term return of 11 dollars in their school and the wider community.

The earlier social emotional learning skills are developed, the better

According to a study commissed by the OECD, teaching kindergarteners basic social and emotional skills [can] have long-term academic benefits on students' reading and vocabulary, including in high poverty schools, suggesting that SEL may assist in closing achievement gaps."

Overall, students with strong social and emotional skills are:

- More engaged in learning
- Less likely to drop out of school
- Less likely to have behavior issues

More confident and have higher self-esteem (Prodigy)
